Hello again. I would like to mention two major tournaments coming up which concern the majority of the membership. These two tournaments are the Carolinas Open and the 1983 North Carolina Scholastics.

The Carolinas Open is a yearly tournament open to all North and South Carolina Chess Association members. Last September at the annual business meeting the membership voted to eliminate this event as a required tournament due to its two-year hiatus. However, through the hard work of Marion Mahaffey this tournament is again a reality. The 1983 Carolinas Open will be held April 9 and 10 at the University of South Carolina at Lancaster, and more details are available in the Upcoming Tournaments section (pp. 6-7). I would like to say that the 80% return on entry fees is well above average for a tournament such as this. I encourage everyone who can to attend so that this tournament can continue in the future. Also, N.C. Grand Prix points can be won in this tournament.

The other major tournament coming up is the 1983 North Carolina Scholastics. Full details of the Scholastics are also available in the Upcoming Tournaments section, but briefly the tournament will be held April 8-10 at Carroll Junior High School in Raleigh. There will be a preview article next issue, which will appear early in March.

Moving on to one other item of concern ... I have been told that much news in the western part of the state has not been reaching the Gambit recently. I would again ask for contributions -- especially Tournament reports, games, and chess club reports. As I have said so many times before, the Gambit exists only with your contributions. So, please help us out.

The North Carolina Grand Prix is a year-long tournament sponsored by the NCCA. ## PAN-AMERICAN INTERCOLLEGIATE TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

December 26-30, 1982

Sixty-two teams participated in this years Pan-Am Intercollegiate at Columbus, Ohio. The traditional holiday tournament was topped by perennial power Toronto, and The University of Chicago (A) was the highest scoring U.S. team. North Carolina was represented creditably by two teams, Duke University and UNC-Chapel Hill. Duke, with an average rating of 2049, scored 4.5-3.5 against top competition, defeating Chicago A and drawing Penn (2154), MIT A (2119) and Purdue (2097). Duke was led by the incredible performance of Peter Gilruth (2235), who went 7-1 and defeated one senior master, four masters, an expert, and an unrated (see pp. 12-14). Also scoring for Duke were Bill Mason (2215; 4-4), Mark Becker (1957, 2.5-5.5), and Jeff Melton (1788, 4-4).

With only three players, UNC had to spot each opponent a game at the start of each match, yet finished with a respectable score of 3-5, the top three-man team. Maurice Dana (2200) led UNC with a 6-2 mark, Robert Singletary (1664) scored 4-4, and Tim Champion (1413) went 2-6.

NCCA President Robert Singletary was elected President of the Intercollegiate Chess League of America at its annual business meeting on December 28, between rounds at the Pan-Am. The ICLA is responsible for coordinating collegiate chess activities for the United States, including sponsoring the Pan-Am.

GAMESHERO OF THE MONTH: PETER GILRUTH

The Pan-American Intercollegiate Team Tournament is one of the strongest traditional tournaments in the country. Virtually all of the top young players in North America have waged war in the Pan-Am, and for many very good players this has proven an exceptionally difficult tournament. Thus the sterling showing of Duke graduate student Peter Gilruth in the 1982 Pan-Am is truly outstanding: his score of 7-1 on first board, with no less than five of his opponents being masters, was topped only by Joel Benjamin with 7.5-.5 and may be the most exceptional performance by any North Carolina player in all of 1982.

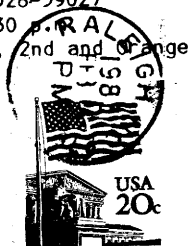
